

# Mark's Gospel, chapter 8

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This man [Paul] is my chosen instrument to carry my name before the Gentiles and their kings and before the people of Israel. I will show him how much he must suffer for my name.

#### Moses is *reflecting* God's glory, Jesus is *radiating* God's glory.

At present we are on the outside of the world, the wrong side of the door... but all the leaves of the New Testament are rustling with the rumor that it will not always be so. Some day, God willing, we shall get in.
